YCS SUMMER OF SERVICE 2023

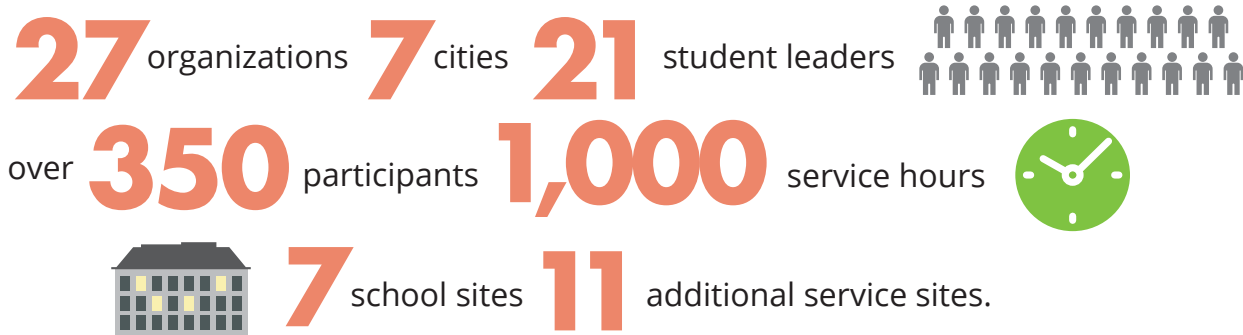
48 youth leaders

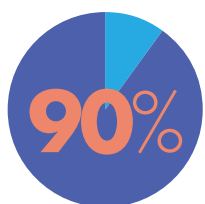

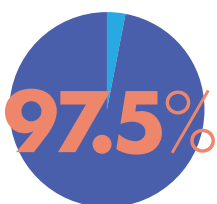
YCS YOUTH VOICE METRICS: HIGH SCHOOL

Youth Voice Metrics from High School students shone a light on how experiences cultivate leadership.

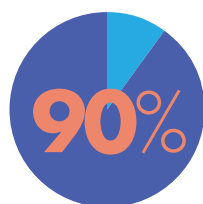
100 YCS engaged High School students were surveyed and the results are inspiring. They shared that through YCS programs:
